A VERY DIFFERENT CHRISTMAS STORY

During the end of October I went to Israel for 12 days. I went with 8 others from CIYD & CMS. It was a wonderful experience. but it was not what I expected. The 1st day we went to explore the old walled city of Jerusalem. There we saw all the famous sights, including the Western Wall, the Dome of the Rock, and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre (where Jesus was crucified). It was a very emotional visit as it really made the Bible come to life. We visited all the different quarters of the city. A long, but great day.

Day 2 was spent with Musalaha, who are a group of Christians trying to bring peace between Israelis and Palestinians. They bring teenagers from all sides together into the desert. In desert conditions, people have to work together to survive in the extreme heat. They learn about each other and through this fellowship the divisions between them are broken down

On the Thursday we went back to Musalaha to meet some of the teenagers who explained the advantages of the desert experience and the friendships that have been made. We met with the Bishop of Jerusalem in his garden and spoke about the situation in Israel and Palestine. Later that night we spoke with Mordechai Vanunu (the man who revealed the Israeli position with nuclear arms). We heard about his very harrowing story of being imprisoned and what he had to go through. We then went to talk to Henry (whose grandmother comes from Kerry) to talk about his 'Kids for Peace' programme and then our group split up into twos and I went on to meet with a Jewish family which was a lovely experience. When all of our group met up again we discussed how both sides know so little about each others position (eq. how the media and Israeli government cleverly keep things very divided as some of the Jewish people know very little about 'The Wall', and the Palestinians never meet with Israelis because of the restrictions on movement so they only Israelis they know are the army).

Friday we met with Sabeel, and we travelled with them to different places such as the wall and a checkpoint and praved for some end to the destruction we saw everywhere.

Saturday we went to Ramallah where we went into Arafat's complex, which is a complete mound of rubble. Then we went to a

school where we saw the complete upheaval of the teenager's lives. They were so despairing about their futures they could see no hope of things improving in this land.

On Sunday we had time off so some of us went to the Mount of Olives, which was very beautiful and serene. It was really needed as it had been a hard few days, there was a lot to take in.

On Monday we headed for Bethlehem, and in my innocence I expected a pretty little town full of joy. However that was not the case. First we had to go through a checkpoint. then we had to walk down this rubble filled street with kids following us, selling chewing gum and tissues. We had to walk away from the checkpoint, as the taxi drivers are in fear of getting shot if they go near the checkpoint. It was so sad, and I kept thinking to myself about how much we have here, how we have so much freedom to go where we like. And the Palestinians here live in fear of going through checkpoints to travel 4km down to Jerusalem. and that's if they get through the checkpoint.

We then went to WIAM, another group who are working for peace. Then Diane, a vouth worker from the North and I went to stay with Lucy, a Palestinian. Lucy and her family all live in the one building, and they talked about the six day siege in Bethlehem when they have curfews. We met with her friends, some of whom have hope because they can get out of the country as they have family living here in Ireland and they are allowed to visit them. Then there are those who are suffering from depression because they know that they will never be able to leave Bethlehem in the foreseeable future. We also met the governor of Bethlehem who prays for peace soon.

On Thursday we went to see the church of the Nativity, where Jesus was born. We also went to see the shepherd's field, and it was wonderful to see it. But it was becoming less important to see the sites, compared to hearing about the ordinary people's lives.

This was certainly a very different Christmas story. I know singing "O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie" will have a completely different meaning for me. this and every Christmas from now on. So I just ask you to keep all the people of this land in your prayers this Christmas time.
