From the Rector:

I would like to say a very sincere 'thank you' to everyone who has made me so welcome in the parish. It was back on 22nd February that I first came to Mountrath to meet with the nominators, Joe Peavoy, Sylvia Stotesbury, Ivan Jestin and William Whitten, and had a great day, and have enjoyed all the moments since.

The institution service on 18th May was a great occasion, those who travelled from Dublin expressed thanks for the great welcome they received and I would want to express a personal word of thanks to all who were responsible for the evening, both at the church and in providing the bountiful supper at the hall afterwards.

Living in two places is going to present challenges, but it is my intention to be present and working in the parish for two parts of each day - either morning and afternoon or afternoon and evening. I am planning to put a 'call divert' on the telephone at the Rectory so if I am not at the Rectory, the call will divert to my mobile. Should you wish to phone the mobile directly, the number is 087 240 5753.

Growing up in a community in Somerset in England that was more rural than most of the parish - it was three miles to the nearest bus stop - I know rural communities are places where news travels quickly; please if you hear word of someone ill, or someone in hospital, or of a bereavement in a family, do let me know.

On Sundays, my desire is that we would have regular worship at a regular time; this is important to the faithful, but is also important if we are to have an outreach to wider society: how will people come through our church doors if those doors are closed?

Meeting with the churchwardens from the parishes, we discussed possible patterns of worship. My current intention is that on the first and third Sundays of the month, I will take Roskelton at 9.30, Annatrim/Lacca at 10.30 and Mountrath at 11.30 and a lay reader will take Seir Kieran at 9.30 and Borris in Ossory at 11.00. On the second and fourth Sundays, I will take Seir Kieran at 9.30 and Borris in Ossory at 11.00 and a lay reader will take Annatrim/Lacca at 10.30 and Mountrath at 11.30. It all seemed very tidy

until I realized that if Annatrim and Lacca had services on alternate Sundays and I was there on alternate Sundays, I would always be in the same church. We will have to look at how we work out the pattern of services.

Archdeacon Leslie Stevenson, preaching at the institution service, talked about the need for the church to be the servant of the people if it is to command respect in a world that has given up on listening to the church. My hope is that I come among you as one who serves. Rectors come and Rectors go, it is the people who remain; the church belongs to the people and a wise Rector knows to listen and not to order. The parish will become what people want it to be.

Please pray for me in the years ahead as I do my best to be the sort of servant that Jesus expects me to be.

The death of Ken McDowell of Redcastle on Friday, 30th April at the Mater Hospital in Dublin was a profound shock to all who knew and loved him.

A man with a great love for land and livestock, Ken had farmed since leaving school at the age of fourteen. Farming was a vocation for Ken, a calling, which meant the daily work of milking twice a day was not a burden, but a task in which he found fulfilment.

Ken's great love was for his family and his home, being with those

who were dearest to him, sitting around the table with Dorothy and his family. A recent photograph of Ken, sat in his usual chair beside the table, is a picture of contentment, a picture of someone happy in life.

A committed and practical Christian, Ken gave years of service to his church, as a parishioner as a vestry member, and as a warden; Ken was a man for doing things rather than talking about them.

Archdeacon John Murray, the Revd Stella Jones, and the Revd Cliff Jeffers officiated at Ken's funeral in Mountrath and he was laid to rest in the graveyard, at the foot of the grave of his father who was buried less than three years previously.

We extend our sympathy and prayers to Dorothy and the family in this time of great sadness. The cross on Ken's grave is inscribed 'Safe in the arms of Jesus' and we pray that faith may be a comfort and support to those bereaved by Ken's death.
