Tuesday, 27th November - Fly to Frankfurt in Germany to catch an Ethiopian Airlines flight to Addis Ababa in Ethiopia

Wednesday, 28th November - Fly from Addis Ababa to Kigali, capital of Rwanda. Travel to Shyogwe diocese for afternoon meetings

Thursday, 29th November - Visit work in Gahogo Parish and Gitarama Parish

Friday, 30th November - Visit Ruyumba Demonstration Farm and Training Centre (for which the bishop did his vintage tour of the diocese) and to Rugabagoba Parish (home of Amos Nsengiyumva, who is studying at Gurteen College)

Saturday, 1st December - Travel to the Rwanda-Burundi border to be met by the Revd Clement Ninziza (who studied in Dublin in 2007-2008) to travel to Bujumbura

Sunday, 2nd December - Preach in the Revd Clement's parish outside of Bujumbura

Monday, 3rd December - Meet with members of the Mothers' Union in Burundi (whose literacy project has been supported by the Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal) and the YWCA in Bujumbura (whose work with women has been supported by Bishops' Appeal). Return to Rwanda

Tuesday, 4th December - Visit Nyamagana Health Centre (supported by Bishops' Appeal) and Cyeru Pineapple Project (which will benefit from the Ruyumba Farm training).

Wednesday, 5th December - Visit Vunga Vocational Training Centre (where a building programme was funded by Bishops' Appeal)

Thursday, 6th December - 0225 flight from Kigali - arrive back in Dublin at 2305
