Rector's Letter

Camping holidays or lives possessed? It seems an odd question, I'll explain.

Recently in church, we read the story from Saint Luke Chapter 8 of the man possessed by a demon that called itself "Legion." When reading that story, there is a temptation to think, "That was interesting, but it has nothing to do with me." But if we look again at the story, we see that the spirit that possesses the man is destroying the man's life, Saint Luke Chapter 8 Verse 27 tells us, "For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs." The spirit does not want to let go of the man, we read in Verses 28-29, "'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me'— for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man."

If it all seems a long time ago in a country far away, perhaps we need to ask what spirits there are that might possess people's lives today, what things there are that destroy lives, what things there are that won't let go. The various addictions are the most obvious things possessing lives, whether they be addictions to substances or to stuff on the Internet, they destroy lives and are hard to escape. In Jesus' time, addictions that are common now were unknown, but he still encounters lives possessed by destructive spirits. The thing Jesus warns most strongly against is being taken over by Mammon, he gives stern warnings in Saint Matthew Chapter 6 and Saint Luke Chapter 16 that we have to choose between living our

lives for God and living our lives for money and material things, "No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon."

Mammon has become the spirit that controls the lives of many people, and like many spirits it is destructive and hard to escape. We can be so concerned with money and material things that we lose the important things. We can assume that we must have money, and more and more of it, to be secure, to be happy; and we can find that chances of happiness have passed us by.

Some of my favourite memories from childhood days were going camping with my family. We stayed on a campsite where the toilets and the water taps were in the next field; we spent the days on the beach; we went for walks; we played games; maybe we would go for a drive to another seaside village in the evening; we fell asleep as soon as we got into our sleeping bags. We didn't have any money to spend.

The summer can be an opportunity for doing things which bring us happiness, which leave us happy memories, let's not be so concerned with mammon that we miss our chances. The evil spirit was destroying the life of that man; let's not let the spirit of mammon destroy our lives.

New Centre in Dublin Port Offers Seafarers a Home Away From Home

Dublin Port's new Seafarers' Centre was officially opened in June. The beautiful new centre is on the site of the old Odium's mill at the port and from it the Mission to Seafarers and Stella Maris offer an invaluable ministry to seafarers from all over the world.

The €500,000 state-of-the-art centre will cater for the 7,500 seafarers and sailors that arrive into the Port every year. Facilities include free Wi-Fi access for sailors to contact family and loved ones while ashore, cooking and dining facilities and a relaxation and recreation space including a pool table, library and TV den with beanbags. There is also a chaplain available on request, they give out free Bibles and woolly hats are given out in winter.

Statement from the Archbishop of Dublin Following Orlando Attack

The Archbishop of Dublin, the Most Revd Dr Michael Jackson, issued the following statement following the horrific attack on a nightclub in Orlando, Florida.

"Outrage and incredulity combine as we in Ireland, like the rest of the world, try to take in the enormity and the evil of the horrific events in Orlando, Florida. These events, targeting a specific section of the community, have, once again, brought terror and hatred to the forefront in a place where people have been among friends and living their lives. As people come to terms with the attack on Pulse Nightclub in Orlando, we hold all those who have lost their loved ones and all who have been injured and traumatised by the mass shooting in our prayers. We remember victims, friends and family members at this time of devastation. We echo the statements which say that this had nothing to do with religion. These events are becoming all too common. It is for this reason that we hold before God each individual who has suffered and each individual who has died as a special person and as a child of God's creation. Right across the faiths of the world we long and pray for a time when there will be an end to such attacks and an end to the needless and senseless loss of human life."

Funeral: Annie Julia (Nancy) Fagan of Villa Marie Nursing Home, Roscrea (formerly of Grangemore, Borris-in-Ossory) at Saint Mark's Church, Borris-in-Ossory on Wednesday, 15th June 2016. Born in 1933, Nancy was a child when the Second World War began and her family were evacuated from Rotherhithe in east London, an area which suffered severely during the Blitz and from the V1 flying bombs. The contrast between Rotherhithe and West Kingsdown in Kent was great and gave Nancy an abiding love for the peace and beauty of country places. Growing up the daughter of parents who were shopkeepers, Nancy came to know farming life through her marriage to her husband John who brought Nancy back to his native Ireland, farming first in Co Waterford and then at Borris-in-Ossory. Country life in the rural Midlands was very different from life in Rotherhithe, Nancy devoted herself to being a wife and a mother to Ann, Tony and Neil, as well as playing an active part in the life of the community, where the Irish Countrywomen's Association had a special place in her

heart. Living beside Ann and her husband Eric in recent times, Nancy's granddaughter Gillian was a special companion to her. Alzheimer's disease brought Nancy into a nursing care for the final part of her life, receiving excellent care at Villa Marie Nursing Home. Nancy's funeral service was followed by interment at the new cemetery in Borris-in-Ossory.

Suicide has ended the life of a person you loved dearly. It is possible to experience grief in many different ways and every individual's loss will be unique to them. There is no time limit or logical order in the way people go through emotions and reactions to loss and grief but some of the typical ones may include:

The Suicide Bereavement Liaison Service (Midlands) is a local service available to individuals/families and persons who have been bereaved by suicide. Anyone affected by suicide is welcome to make contact with the Liaison Person either for support or to learn about what services may be available to them in the Midlands. The support can be provided hours, days, weeks or years after the loss.

Getting in Touch

The Suicide Bereavement Liaison Person can be contacted by telephone or can meet directly with a bereaved person on a one-to-one/group basis in a mutually agreed location as appropriate, i.e. family home etc. The Liaison Person can answer specific questions you may have about some of the difficult practical issues following a death by suicide. You may want support, guidance or assistance in helping with communicating with the Gardai or Coroners, etc., accessing a therapeutic service or even just to talk about what has happened. In some cases, there may be a specific concern about the reactions and emotions individuals and families are experiencing. In all cases your call will be welcomed.
