#### Bishop Michael Burrows' letter to the Clonenagh Group of Parishes as read to church congregations on Sunday 17th September

Dear Friends of Clonenagh Group,

Matters have rapidly moved on since last I wrote to vou, and vou will have heard the news of the resignation of the rector. While it does not take effect until October 31, in practice he will not be returning. He is already in England at the home of his parents and plans to remain there. Like me, you will be saddened and indeed mystified by all of this.

However, what is essentially private must remain private. A combination of family and other circumstances has led Canon Poulton to decide that it was best for him to conclude his ministry in the Church of Ireland. He has written quite publicly in the Diocesan Magazine and elsewhere of some of the personal difficulties he has faced in recent times. I had earnestly hoped he might step back from the decision he has now made. but clearly that was not to be.

I truly hope that you will recall lan's ministry, not through the misty lens of his sudden departure, but rather with а appreciation of all the great good he has done among you. He has been in so many ways the ideal pastor.... Diligent, imaginative understand ourselves. and greatly admired. The parish achieved splendid things under his guidance. Yet I realise just how shocking With affection and with prayer, news of his sudden departure will be for Michael Cashel Ferns and Ossory those who were particularly supported by his September 17, 2017 pastoral care.

We can but thank God for all that he gave us, and pray for him as he faces a future in a very different context. We remember his family and especially his wife Katharine. She will continue to serve as dean of Ossorv and her ministry is much appreciated across the diocese.

In November I will proceed to make the necessary arrangements to fill the vacant incumbency. In the meantime archdeacon Orr is doing all he can to maintain continuity of pastoral care. As amid our confusion we look to the future. I am confident that someone will before long be raised up for the task of ministry in this vibrant parish with rich potential.

I know you will leave church today with heavy hearts and with some confusion. The loss to ministry among us of so fine a priest is an indication of how fragile we all are as human beings, how auickly circumstances can change. The clergy, as lan himself has written, are as fragile and vulnerable as anybody else. In our frailty fuller and sadness, we can but entrust ourselves to the tender mercy of God, who always understands us even when we fail to

#### WORRY

Some say, that the person who isn't a worrier isn't aware of what is happening. There may be some truth in that but equally, constant worrying saps all the joy from your life.

There is an old tale that goes like this;

If you are going to die then you have only two things to worry about, whether you will go to Heaven or whether you won't go to Heaven. If you go to Heaven then you have nothing to worry about. If you don't go to Heaven then you'll meet so many friends there you'll feel very much at home. So don't worry.
