He was rector of Newcastle in Co Wicklow until 1999, where he was succeeded by the Revd William Bennett and for the past fifteen years has been rector of Shandon parish, on the north side of Cork city. Brian is married to Agnes, who retired from her career as a national school teacher earlier this year. Brian's institution as rector will take place in the new year.
