## **Parish Notes**

Mountrath Harvest: Our thanksqiving season begins on Sunday, with Philip a generous contribution to-Mountmellick, as our preacher.

Harvest offerings: We need not look far in the newspapers, or on the television news, for stories about where money has gone; sometimes even the government does not seem to know where money has gone. In times when there is a lack of transparency, and when we have become very distrustful about how money is spent, we have tried in our parishes to be clear about where the money we give actually goes.

This year, the plan is very practical. Each time the rector has visited Rwanda, he has visited the village of Nyamagana where there is a desperate need for a new health clinic. In 2011, the Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal gave €25,000 for the upgrading of the dispensary in the village, including providing new equipment. Part of the way through that work, the local government officials came along and said the dispensary was not sufficient for the needs of the community, a clinic was needed.


